

Dear Berliners, international guests, and friends of Tanz im August!

This year, Tanz im August is celebrating its 25th anniversary. Which is why we will be using this opportunity to take a look back at the festival's beginnings. Back then, New York was, without a doubt, one of the epicentres of postmodern dance, and Trisha Brown and Steve Paxton were two of its undisputed champions. The Trisha Brown Dance Company and Steve Paxton will be in Berlin to open Tanz im August with "Early Works" and "Bound" respectively – works that set the stage and determined the style for an entire generation of dancers.

The world of dance has broadened considerably in the last 25 years, expanding from its former Western stronghold. Contemporary dance has become global, and now has a wider range of themes and aesthetics than ever before.

The anniversary edition of the festival is on the trail of this dynamic change: in "Drums and Digging" the Congolese choreographer Faustin Linyekula examines the political and social distortion in his home country. In "CRACKz", Bruno Beltrão, from Brazil, focuses on "humanity's repertoire of gesture", found on the internet by himself and his dancers and used as a starting point

for their choreography. "The Goldlandbergs", a piece from the Israeli choreographer Emanuel Gat, is inspired by a radio documentary done by star Canadian pianist Glenn Gould on the life of a Mennonite community in Canada. The works of young choreographers, too, such as Eisa Jocson from the Philippines, Sujata Goel from India, François Chaignaud and Cecilia Bengolea from France / Argentina, Javiera Péon-Vega from Chile, or Jan Martens from Belgium also create a fascinating interlocking web of different times and cultures, blending and inspecting local tradition, regional history, and global issues.

In addition, to celebrate the 25th anniversary of Tanz im August, we are presenting an early work from the artist Tino Sehgal: "[untitled] (2000)", a "Museum of Dance" embodied on stage by three different performers.

“GIRLS” ist das Gegenstück zu “Women”, mit dem der belgische Choreograf Ugo Dehaes 2011 Erfolge feierte. Acht Tänzerinnen im Alter von 34 bis 56 Jahren verhandelten ihre Position in der Gruppe und fragten, ob auch im zeitgenössischen Tanz ein ideales Körperbild gilt. Ihr Bewegungsmaterial reicht Dehaes mit “GIRLS” an acht Mädchen im Alter von 10 bis 14 Jahren weiter. Unbe-

schwert eignen sich die Teenagerinnen die Choreografie an und deuten das abstrakte Material für sich um, in eine Verhandlung über Freundschaft und Zusammengehörigkeit. Als Zuschauer lernt man in der so heiteren wie erfrischend ernsthaften Arbeit acht junge, eigenständige Persönlichkeiten kennen.

The Belgian choreographer Ugo Dehaes passed material, previously performed by eight female dancers in his successful piece “Women”, to eight girls aged between 10 and 14. The teenagers blithely appropriated his choreography, re-interpreting the abstract material as a treatise on friendship and togetherness.
